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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Education is the key for sustained growth and development. The Hon. Founder President and Principal Dr. Rajkumar Kolhe of Jahnvis Multi Foundation's Vande Mataram Degree College (VMDC) has chosen the way of education for the development of the society. The college was founded in 2009 on permanently non-grant basis, affiliated to the University of Mumbai and approved by the Government of Maharashtra. The institution started 14 years back with just 2 UG programmes has today 12 UG programmes and 4 PG programmes.

VMDC is an ISO 9001:2015 certified institution located at Dombivli West, Thane District. Majority of the students are first generation learners from Dombivli, Kopar, Kalwa, Mumbra, Diwa and neighboring areas that are the suburbs of Mumbai, who are financially and socially deprived groups. Students from distant places too select this College for the support that it gives for achieving this gift – Education.

Admission to any student was never denied for want of money. Economically backward students are facilitated to take admission by paying even less than 5% of the programme fee. Management provides various types of scholarships and freeships to students in addition to those provided by the Government. Multiple instalment facility is also provided enabling convenience in fee payment.

Various types of training, internships and skill-development programmes under the MOUs with large number of organisations are arranged aligning them with the mission and vision of the institution to prepare students to meet the industrial requirements. A large number of community services are also done for CSR.

VMDC has well-developed laboratories for Chemistry, Botany and Zoology courses, digital library, fully digitalized office, state-of-the-art Media lab for film production, three Computer labs for IT based learning, three conference halls with audio-visual facilities to fulfill the academic thirst of the new generation.

Open Door Communication and Single-Window solutions prevail in the College for achieving the goals set. The Incubation Center and Entrepreneurial Development Centre enable students and teachers to evolve and develop in research and creative activities.

- There is more intake of working students in the college. We allow them to work simultaneously as it is important for them to fulfill their daily needs. Ultimately this ends up affecting the college.
- Students are from vernacular background & their medium of instruction make some sort of difficulties for them.

Curricular Aspects

Curriculum Planning and Delivery

The college follows the University of Mumbai for curriculum planning and formulates an Academic calendar with input from IQAC, the Vice-Principal, and the Examination committee.

Continuous Internal Assessment is done by various methods to evaluate students' performance. Absenteeism is handled with the substitution of teachers, and semester-wise plans are shared via Google Classroom, especially during COVID-19.

The teaching-learning process is assessed by the college coordinator and administrators through feedback methods for better curriculum enhancement. Remedial lectures taken by teachers for slow learners, emphasizing outcome-based learning and syllabus completion.

Certificate Courses

The college offers certificate courses to provide skill knowledge in various fields. Certificate courses cover specific subjects or areas and have 30 30-hour duration of completion. They focus on practical skills and industry-specific knowledge.

Project/Internship/Field Visit

College projects, internships, and field visits are vital parts of experiential learning. TY Students work on Projects, which entail in-depth research or practical work on a specific topic. Internships offer students hands-on experience in the real world. Field visits provide opportunities for students to observe and learn from specific domains.

Cross-Cutting Issues

Cross-cutting issues such as professional ethics, gender equality, human values, and environmental sustainability are integral considerations across various domains of study and practice. Professional ethics encompass the moral principles and standards guiding conduct within specific professions. Gender equality advocates for equal opportunities irrespective of gender, aiming to eliminate discrimination. Human values emphasize principles like compassion, empathy, and social responsibility. Environmental sustainability addresses the responsible use of resources.

Feedback Process

The feedback process for degree college academic performance and ambiance involves taking input from students, faculty, and all other stakeholders to assess various aspects of the learning. Students provide feedback on teaching quality, course content, and facilities through surveys. The feedback is collected systematically and analyzed to identify strengths, weaknesses, and areas for improvement. Based on the feedback received, the college administration implements targeted interventions and initiatives to enhance academic performance and create a positive learning ambiance.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Teaching, learning, and evaluation are integral components contributing to the growth and success of any educational institution. Our college emphasizes value-based education combined with practical learning, employing innovative strategies to enhance these aspects. The Admission of students in various programme are done strictly as per the guidelines provided by the University of Mumbai and the Government of Maharashtra including reservations such as SC, ST, OBC, NT, SBC, etc. The college takes maximum efforts to admit the students against sanctioned reserved category by the University of Mumbai. The Admission Committee oversees fair admissions and provides guidance to candidates for selection of programmes. All College activities in the Academic Calendar established by the Academic Calendar Committee. The college is functioning with adequate teachers with the student teacher ratio of 28:1. The college operates a transparent evaluation system and all the aspects of examination are done under the supervision of the Examination Committee, which includes mechanisms for grievance redressal also. Adhering to the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) and University of Mumbai guidelines, the college ensures fairness and consistency in evaluations. Remedial teaching is available for weaker students. All the students are encouraged to participate in intercollegiate competitions to enhance their co-curricular activities. Add-on courses supplement students' knowledge, while interactive teaching methods foster comprehensive student development. Teaching plans incorporate ICT-based learning, with regular updates on ICT tools. For every course under various programmes

in the college UG as well as PG, Programme Outcomes and Course Outcomes are defined. Every teacher takes the required efforts to achieve these Outcomes through various teaching methodologies such as Experiential learning where students are learning by doing the practical experiments in various laboratories, Participative learning where students are participating and learning through various events such as Seminars, Industrial visits, participating in various competitions organized by different departments and Problem Solving where students are solving the problems by doing the Projects and Case studies. Continuous evaluation process are done through the PPT presentations, tests and Assignments. The overall pass percentage of the students in last academic year is 78%.

Research, Innovations and Extension

To Promote Innovation and Entrepreneurship quality in students, the college takes many proactive measures. Research activities are planned and conducted in order to develop a research temperament and entrepreneurial mindset among the learners. The college has Research Development cell (RDC) and Entrepreneurship Development Cell (EDC). College has developed and adopted a comprehensive Research Promotion Policy.

The members of RDC include teachers, UG and PG students, Research Advisory members viz. two external research scholars and one industry expert. The RDC members involved to promote the research culture among the staff and students in this developing stage of college.

College staffs have received grants from University Mumbai for Minor Research Projects. The Research activities in the institute have supported researchers to undertake research projects and have also helped the facilities for their research project. Faculty members have research publications in Scopus and UGC recognized Journals.

The faculty also published textbooks, and chapter edited in the proceedings. The staff members have presented papers in International, National, State level seminars and conferences.

College provides incentives to staff in the form of Registration Fees to participate in various research conferences.

Research Committee in the college organizes workshops and seminar on Intellectual property right, Research Methodology and writing Proposal for Research Grant to promote research culture in the staff and the students.

College promotes students to participate in Avishkar Research Convention organized by University of Mumbai and also participate in science exhibitions organized by other colleges.

The extension activities are conducted by NSS Unit like Swachh Bharat Abhiyan, Blood Donation camps, Cleanliness drive, Tree plantation, voter awareness and voters card distributions adhar card camp, health checkup camp, vaccination drive disaster management and gender sensitization.

The College has 26 functional MOUs with industries and academia and conducted activities such as seminars, workshop, guest lectures Industrial Visits and internship.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Infrastructural facilities and learning resources are the basics that support all activities required for creating a learning organisation. Vande Mataram College has all the necessary facilities. It has sufficient number of classrooms with required amenities. 8 smart class rooms with LED TVs facilitate effective teaching. Portable projectors are also available for ICT presentations. Three conference halls with required ICT facilities and two with interactive TV help the teachers to organise seminars/conferences. There are 8 well-equipped laboratories such as Chemistry, Life science, Computer and Media. These facilitate experiential learning suiting to the industry requirements.

The College has spacious library with good amount of knowledge resources. There is a digital library that helps the students with numerous linkages of various online libraries having thousands of books, journals and periodicals. The library has Braille software and other requirements for visually challenged students. The college has a Research Center to boost research activity, and an Incubation Center to facilitate entrepreneurship.

For conducting co-curricular and extracurricular activities and also for student's practice, sufficient spaces are provided. The college has a trainer to train and support students playing various games and sports, who helps them to bring many medals. The gymnasium at the ground floor has latest equipments.

The entire campus is wifi enabled, and secured with CCTV cameras surveillance. All the facilities are periodically updated according to requirements. The college uses MKCL software for Office and Accounting management. The results of first year and second year undergraduate programmes are processed within the College and the mark sheets are printed internally. Required upgraded printing and scanning facilities are available.

The College has NSS room, Canteen, Counseling Room, Placement Room, Yoga center and Meditation center. Separate wash rooms are available for boys and girls. Divyangan wash room facility with wheelchair is also available. Lift facility is available. Purified drinking water facility, Firefighting system, fire extinguishers, Rain harvesting, etc. are available in the campus. The solar energy generated from panels installed on the terrace of the College building helps to reduce the energy expenditure to a great extent. The management ensures that the facilities available are optimum utilized.

Student Support and Progression

The main aim of the institution is to help and support the students in various areas such as scholarship, free ship, placement, timely redressal mechanism, career guidance sessions and alumni engagement etc.

The institution provides the scholarship, free ship and JMF's scholarship for student support and progression. The college offers various sessions under Skill Enhancement and Capacity Building for students' development and improvement. Sessions conducted by institutions such as Personality Development, English Language Teaching, German Language Teaching, Yoga, Soft Skill Development, Orientation Programme, Microsoft Excel, Cyber Security, Free Style dancing etc.

To encourage students, we had organised various sessions on Career Guidance and competitive exams and also conducted coaching through Reliable Academy.

Our college conducted various programmes on Career Counselling and Competitive Examinations such as sessions on Taxation & Banking, seminar on Graphics, Animation, Photography and VFX, seminar on Guidance for Competitive Exams (MPSC/UPSC, SSC, Railway), Seminar for commerce student etc.

The institution has Students Grievance Redressal Cell who take initiatives to solve the problems. To promote awareness our institution has created policy, conducted meetings, organised Seminars, created Posters, put Suggestion Box, etc. For students' Placement our institution had conducted a placement drive camp. The student from our institute had appeared in various examinations such as MAH-LLB, NEET etc.

Our institution has conducted various programmes under sports and cultural activities to help students discover their hidden skills and talents. We have conducted activities such as Intercollegiate Kabaddi, Intercollegiate quiz competition, National Festivals, Happy Campus Lucky Campus, all religions prayer for world peace, Annual function, International Festival, Indoor & Outdoor Sports, Poster competition etc.

Students got national, state and University level and intercollegiate awards or medals in various fields such as Powerlifting, Kabaddi, Judo championship, Personality contest.

Our institute has registered alumni. The Alumni Association significantly contributes to the college's growth and development through various initiatives such as admission support, scholarship, guidance lectures, social service, job placement support, and outreach activities.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	Teachers focus to facilitate interdisciplinary learning of students. The college departments jointly organize seminars, workshops that provide opportunity to all the students to participate and learn on areas beyond their major disciplines. Every programme encompasses courses that are multi-disciplinary in nature. For instance, BA has languages such as Hindi and English along with specialized courses such as Economics, History and Psychology. The specialized programmes in Banking and Insurance, Accounting and Finance and Management Studies have multidisciplinary courses such as Business Law, Finance and Taxation, Environmental Studies, English and Mathematics. Foundation Course at UG programmes is the best example of multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary course that contains the topics of Constitution, Social Responsibility, Ethics, Management and Environment.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	The College has successfully managed the conducting of examination under the Credit-Based Grading System, an approach that enables assigning grades for each semester and programme. The system accommodates variations in course design, such as a 75/25 (external/internal) system and 100 marks external as allotted by the University of Mumbai. The college has already started the registration of students for ABC and is focusing on completing it by the academic year 2024-2025 as it would simplify the process of acquiring and representing students' academic achievement, and will provide an integrated repository of earnings earned throughout their academic career.

4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	The College recognizes the importance of integrating Indian knowledge systems into its educational programmes as emphasized in NEP. Respecting regional languages, the college offers a Bachelor of Arts programme with a special focus on Marathi for vernacular students. This programme not only enables to preserve local language but also facilitates learning in a language known to the community. In collaboration with Sri.Gurukula Manyasa Sanstha, Seminars were organised for teachers on educational value of Sanskrit. Certificates were issued to the participants. Inspired by the positive feedback of the teachers, the college plans to expand Sanskrit classes to students in the coming years. By including Hindi, Marathi and Sanskrit in the curriculum, the college demonstrates its commitment to supporting the linguistic and cultural heritage of India. Hindi and Marathi Vangmay Divas are also celebrated in the college regularly.
5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	Programme Outcomes and Course Outcomes as described in NEP are taken into consideration sincerely while teaching any topic of courses. College invites industry experts to deliver guest lectures, seminars and workshops for students. Students are also taken to industrial visits where they learn by observing which includes locations namely Lokmat Press, Prime focus Studios, Stock exchange and many more. Alumni students who are now thriving in various career fields visit the college frequently and contribute by organizing educational & extracurricular events for current students. The college strongly encourages students to network with industry professionals at these events. An outstanding example of the college's commitment to bringing theory and practice together is evident in the Film, T.V. & New Media Production programme. JMF Studio housed on VII Floor of the college serves as a place for experiential learning to students interested in Photography, Video Recording and Filming. College motivates students to participate in research events and provides support. The students have got prizes for the presentation of research papers at the National Conferences and Start Up Centre/ Entrepreneurial Cell that boosts the spirit of

	innovation and creativity among students. Efforts are taken to conduct activities in relation to various courses that enable students to learn all practically relevant things through its outcome based Education.

The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

Response:

Curriculum planning:

The college has devised a systematic and well-structured planning process for effective teaching and continuous internal assessment to ensure outcome based learning. The college follows the curriculum planning and delivery strictly as prescribed by the University of Mumbai to which it is affiliated.

Academic Calendar:

The IQAC, in collaboration with the Principal, Vice-Principal, and Examination Committee, formulates an Academic Calendar every year based on the terms specified by the University of Mumbai. Add-on courses are planned and accommodated in the academic calendar. This calendar is published on the college website. Additionally, the Heads of Departments create departmental calendars aligned with the academic calendar to ensure the efficient completion of syllabi and engagement of co-curricular and extracurricular activities.

An orientation program is conducted for FY students in the beginning of the year, to provide them with an introduction on courses, teaching methodologies and examination procedures. The Heads of Departments along with the teachers discuss the workload and make lecture and practical schedules, which are shared with students through various channels such as the college website, notice boards on campus, WhatsApp Groups, and Google Classrooms. Teachers maintain diaries that are regularly reviewed by HODs, the Vice Principal, and the Principal. Special lectures are also planned for slow learners in order to bring them to the level of mainstream students.

Continuous Internal Assessment:

Continuous Internal Assessment is done to evaluate students' performance and understanding of various courses taught to them throughout the year. This is done through Assignments, Projects, Class Tests, Regular follow-up review on learning, Attendance review, and Practical performance assessments.

Class Engagement to manage absenteeism

The HOD's/In-charge teachers ensure that lectures missed due to absence of faculty for personal or professional reasons are engaged by other teachers as far as possible in order not to put the students in a gap.

Curriculum Delivery:

Teachers create semester-wise lesson plans, which are shared with students at the commencement of each semester. Faculty members use Google Classroom Learning Management System for the dissemination of relevant information such as internal evaluation, study materials, PPTs and videos. During the covid-19 period online lectures were effectively conducted using online platforms, viz., zoom and Google meet. Digital Contents, Videos, PPT presentations, Contents from YouTube channels were used for effective delivery of curriculum.

To ensure effective curriculum delivery and syllabus completion, Heads of Departments, the Vice-Principal, and the Principal use direct and indirect methods of assessment of teaching effectiveness. Regular feedback is taken in each term course wise in order to assess the effectiveness of curriculum delivery and gauge the quality. The feedback collected is analyzed and required follow-up is taken considering the learners needs.

The college considers all cross cutting issues relevant to professional ethics, gender, human values, environment and sustainability while conducting any program indoor or outdoor for the students as well as the staff members.

1. Professional Ethics:

- Various Program in the college encompass curricula that highlight the significance of professional ethics.
- Professional Ethics is a module taught in courses like Business Law, Business communication, Entrepreneurship Management, Soft skill Development, Industrial Law, Employee Relations and Welfare, Organizational Behavior, Strategic HRM and others. 1. Gender:

- The college has a Women Development Cell headed by a senior lady teacher. Gender sensitization Programmes are conducted regularly by the cell.
- Women's Day is celebrated every year on 8th March, where the significance of mutual respect to all genders used to be highlighted by specially invited eminent guests. Self-defense training Programmes are conducted to make the students aware and train them as to how to manage difficult situations.
- Curricula of educational Programmes are designed highlighting the gender issues. For instance, the Foundation Course subject has topics of gender importance highlighting awareness on gender issues, constitutional guidelines, rules regarding domestic violence, etc. Students are allotted topics of projects like women empowerment, Rights of Women, Equality of labor, etc. for their internals.

1. Human Values:

- Imparting human values to students through different activities is a conscious plan of the college. Blood donation camps are arranged regularly at the college as a charity activity in association with Plasma & Arpan Blood Bank Dombivli to help people in case of need.
- In order to emphasis the execution of love and affection with equality irrespective of classes of people our students visit orphanages and old age home and distribute chocolates and other eatables to orphans and old people, and spend day with them by organizing different activities.
- During the Covid Period college management has given the entire premises for arranging the Covid protection measures for the local community and the staff where also used for helping the poor and affective people.

1. Environment and Sustainability:

- College organizes a tree plantation Programme inside and outside the campus every year. Response:

The College, affiliated to University of Mumbai, strictly adheres to the University guidelines regarding the conduct and assessment of Internal and External examinations. The Academic calendar prepared and circulated in the beginning of the year consists of examination schedules, evaluation and result declaration dates.

Both Internal and the External Examinations for the first year and second year classes of undergraduate Programmes are conducted by the College on behalf of University as per the guidelines provided. All the examination notices and schedules are communicated to the students well in advance through College Notice Boards, students' WhatsApp and Telegram groups, TeachUs App and College Website.

All the examinations are conducted and the assessment of the same is carried out in a transparent manner. During the COVID-19 pandemic, examinations have been conducted online with online proctoring. The internal Assessment is done periodically by giving assignments, tests and presentations. Ample time will be provided to students for preparing assignments, test and examinations.

For each course, three sets of question paper will be prepared following the guidelines prescribed by the Board of Studies concerned and those were reviewed by the examination committee. Proper arrangements for smooth conduct of exam are done by the Examination Committee.

Evaluation of answer books are done by the faculties under Central Assessment Programme at the college to ensure a timely declaration of results. The results are declared within 45 days as per University guidelines. On the day of Result declaration all the students are invited to the college and the best performers are appreciated.

The examinations of both semester V and VI of Under-Graduate Programmes and all semester exams of Post Graduate Programmes are conducted by the University of Mumbai. The assessments are done online by the teachers in online (mu.osdes.in, mu.osmsplashgain.com) and the results are declared by the University. All the details of the same are announced in the University Website.

Mechanism of Exam Grievance Redressal System:

The College has a well-structured mechanism to deal with the grievances regarding Internal and External examination in a transparent, time bound and efficient way. If practice of any unfair means is noticed by the invigilators, it is reported to the Unfair Means Enquiry Committee, who will take required action in time as per the guidelines.

Students who are unsuccessful in any course will be given an opportunity to take ATKT examinations in accordance with the University guidelines. This provision supports them to continue in education without a dropout.

After the result declaration, if any student is not satisfied with the marks/grade scored or having query, he/she can apply for revaluation. The papers applied will be reassessed and the results will be informed to student concerned within 15 days. The students can apply for Photocopies of the answer books immediately after the declaration of results within 8 days and the same will be provided to the students within 3 days.

The Principal, vice Principal and chief Coordinator are always available for resolving issues instantaneously.

3.2 Innovation Ecosystem

3.2.1

The college has an ecosystem for innovations and has initiatives for creation and transfer of knowledge.

To Promote Innovation and Entrepreneurship quality in students, the college takes many proactive measures. Research activities are planned and conducted in order to develop a research temperament and entrepreneurial mindset among the learners.

Institutional Innovation Cell (IIC)

To nurture the culture of Innovation systematically among the students and staff, IIC was established. IIC conducts competitions and workshops to encourage startups by students.

Research Development Cell (RDC)

The members of RDC include teachers, UG and PG students, Research Advisory members viz. two external research scholars and one industry expert. Students doing projects present their findings at the meetings of RDC for evaluation, review and suggestions.

This cell conducts workshops on Research Methodology, and Intellectual Property Rights. A teacher has completed Ph.D in service, and another one has become a Ph.D. guide.

Entrepreneurship Development Cell (EDC)

EDC organises seminar and workshops by experts from industry and academia. It motivates and facilitates students to make and sell products such as 'Herbal Dhoopbatti' and Fruit Crush. The EDC conducts 'Annada' Programme, where Student Entrepreneurs prepare & sell meals to staff members. The Management provides seed-money to students to commence new entrepreneurial ventures.

Incubation Center

In order to develop innovation and critical thinking in students, the college has initiated setting up an incubation center on 7th floor. A proposal is already submitted to Ministry of Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MSME), Government of India, to have a collaborated incubation center. A MOU is also in Process.

Research Support to Staff

Management gives financial support along with duty leave to staff for participating in Research workshops, conferences and Paper publications. It has the policy of felicitating teachers who complete Ph.D. Degree with additional increments.

The teachers have received grants from University of Mumbai for Minor Research Project.

Progressive Research by Staff Members

Teachers actively pursue research and they present research papers in conferences, seminars and workshops.

Dr. Amrita Singh, a faculty from Chemistry department won Bronze Medal in Aavishkar Research Convention by University of Mumbai.

Four teachers qualified PET in the academic year 2021. One staff member has registered for Ph.D. under University of Mumbai. one staff members submitted application for patent registration.

Students Research

Students are active in doing research. RDC supports them in writing proposal, preparing Projects and research articles. Students participation in Research activity increases year after year.

Students have participated in conferences and Aavishkar Research Convention, and presented Research papers in the form of posters, oral and working models. A team of S.Y.B.Sc. Students have been selected in the final round of Aavishkar to present their Project titled 'Biodegradable plastic' at University of

Mumbai.

Intercollegiate programme “Chem-Mania” and intra-collegiate Programme "Upheaval" are conducted to create interest and boost research activities.

Students with the aptitude for research are identified and they are guided by teachers to make projects. Management funds students’ research and encourages it.

3.4 Extension Activities**3.4.1**

Outcomes of Extension activities in the neighborhood community in terms of impact and sensitizing the students to social issues for their holistic development during the last five years.

Response:

Fulfilling our institution's Vision and Mission is at the heart of everything we do. That's why, we strongly encourage our students to participate in various extension activities that enrich our community. Through service, we hope to impart the values of compassion, justice and human dignity while developing responsible citizens.

Students are educated and sensitized toward social issues such as poverty, diseases, corruption, discriminations and environmental hazards. Our vibrant NSS unit and various departments such as CS & IT, Chemistry, Commerce, Life Science, Media and Humanities lead the charge, mobilize students for service projects that keep the nearby areas of the College, adopted villages and nearby railway stations clean and green. In the last five years, 42 extension activities have been done by the college. The students longingly engage themselves in various activities such as blood donation camps, health & hygiene activities, swachh bharat abhiyan, free cloth and food distribution, environmental protection and water conservation.

The college conducts tree plantation drive every year to save environment. Thousands of saplings are planted at Titwala village, along the road side and open spaces. The students have participated in large

number and have been inspired to increase the green cover. Under the Medical Flora plantation, our students planted many medical saplings around Kopar station.

Cleanliness drives are held frequently at railway stations such as Dombivli and Kopar, villages such as Dhasai and Shivneri. Road safety campaigns are arranged in association with Ram Nagar Police station, Dombivli (W), wherein the Sub-Inspector along with other officials motivate the young students with the social messages that are spread in the society further by the students.

In association with the Chidanand Charitable Trust Blood Bank and Arpan Blood Bank, blood donation drives are held to help the needy. The students volunteer in doing such activities. Health camps are arranged at adopted villages. Free eye checkups and distribution of glasses are done.

Rallies were organised portraying the morals using slogans, particularly on avoiding child abuse and no voting. Street-plays are organised by NSS volunteers on roads and railway stations regarding corruption, illiteracy, lack of cleanliness, etc.

The college arranges seminars, awareness-programmes, campaigns for issuance of Aadhaar Card and Voter ID in association with Kalyan Dombivli Municipal Corporation. The students actively participate in these activities and get sensitized. The students have got their own Aadhaar cards and voting cards as well as facilitated many members of the general public in getting them.

The teachers along with the students go to the neighboring schools namely Ahilyabai Holkar Municipal School and Bharat Mata School, and teach Computer practical and Physical Science experiments to students who are deprived of such Computer and Science Lab facilities.

During the rainy seasons, every year, the affected slum dwellers in the Anna Nagar, Kopar slums have been sheltered at Vande Mataram College. Students have participated wholeheartedly during Corona crises in activities such as distribution of free masks and sanitizers, as well as conducting RTPCR tests at the college premises in association with the KDMC.

The college has a well-maintained campus with CC TV surveillance. The campus spans over 2225.17 square-meters, with built-up area 53,000 square feet, and is located in a seven-storied building with Roof Top Hall.

Facilities for Curricular Activities

1. Classrooms

The college has sufficient classrooms with good ventilation. Each class is equipped with podium, green board, LED TV and required fans and lights. Every teacher is provided separate key board with mouse to use the LED TVs. Two portable projectors are available.

2. Laboratories

The college has 8 fully furnished laboratories with top-notch equipments. Two Chemistry Labs, have scientific equipments: UV-Spectrophotometer, PH meter, Potentiometer, Colorimeter, etc. Life Science Lab have variety of specimens, Microscope, incubator, Desiccator, etc. Three computer labs have 100 computers and overhead projectors.

Media Lab facilitates video recording, video editing and shooting. Nursing and Paramedical lab has equipments such as Exchanger (ANION CATION), Distillation unit, Microwave, Pipette washer, BP apparatus and Spectrophotometer.

3. Library & Reading Facility

Library with an area of 1200 sq.ft. has diverse collections of reference books, journals and magazines. To facilitate peer-to-peer learning, an Open Area Reading Centre is available at ground-floor up-to 10.00pm.

4. Digital Library

Digital library on 500 sq.ft., has 18 computers with high speed internet connectivity. Braille software with instruments are available.

Facilities for Research Activities

1. Research Centre

It is established with all research facilities.

2. Incubation Centre & Start-up

It functions to facilitate innovation and entrepreneurship

ICT Facilities

1. Computing Equipments

100 computers in 3 laboratories with windows-10 Processor- Intel(R)Core(TM)i5 facilitate students in experiential learning. The staffroom has 4 computers where teachers prepare PPTs and notes. There are 2 photocopy machines and 16 printers.

2. Halls with ICT Facilities

For conducting seminars, webinars, conferences and functions, College has 5 Halls/Centres, two big namely Vishwakarma Natural Roof-Top (600 capacity) and Madhuban Banquet Hall (300 capacity) with two smart TVs and internet connectivity. The open-stage JMF Brahma Rangtalay has around 1000 capacity. Two Conference Halls with audio-visual facilities have capacity of around 150 each. Wireless mikes, webcams and microphones are available for conducting physical and virtual meetings.

Facilities for Co-curricular and Extra-curricular Activities

1. Cultural Activities

For conducting various cultural activities such as Dance, Drama, Singing, Fashion-show and Garba, Vishwakarma Natural Roof-Top, Madhuban Banquet Hall and JMF Brahma Rangtalay equipped with required sound system and lighting are used. Students use these area for practice.

2. Sports Facilities

Spacious ground and required sports equipments are available for playing Volleyball, Throw Ball, Kho-Kho, Kabaddi, Badminton and other athletics. Chess and Carom are practiced at Vishwakarma Natural Roof-Top.

3. Gymnasium

Gymnasium (dimension of 30*40 sq.mts) has equipments like Rods, Dumbles, High at Pulley, Bench press, Seated Rowing, Hyper Extension, Abdominal Conditioner and Stepper.

It spreads over an area of 1700 Sq.ft including Digital Library. Flap Barrier Access Gate with QR Code system is used. Smart Classrooms

Till the year 2021, only 5 classrooms had Smart (Android) TVs for ICT lecture delivery. In the year 2022, number of classes with LED TVs has increased to 08 with the updated version Ultra HD smart LED TV with modern amenities as required for lecture delivery and presentation.

Two interactive TVs with remote control and mike systems are available for conducting seminars, conferences, workshop and guest lectures. For common announcements, the college has sound management system.

Online lectures

During the Covid-19 pandemic, the college has switched to 100 percent online instruction model. The lectures have been delivered with the use of various digital platforms such as Zoom, Google Meet, and Google Classroom to make teaching and learning effective.

Teach Us App

The college has introduced Teach Us App, a modern technology service provider which has lecture scheduler for online and classroom lecture, automatic attendance recording, event attendance recording, real time syllabus tracker, college intelligent analytics, digital notice board, digital notes sharing and faculty feedback.

Attendance of staff

The attendance of teachers and non teaching staff had been taken only with thumb impression before 10/07/2022. A new system of attendance viz. bio metric system T304F with the facility of face recognition as well as thumb impression was introduced on 13/07/22.

Office Administration

The college has introduced MKCL software of University of Mumbai in 2017-18 for admission and administrative matters which has regular auto-updataion. For result processing of FY and SY examinations internally, college acquired Result Software in 2012-13 from Dhanya Girish which was updated in 2022-23. In addition to the existing printers, a high powered printer/scanner/copier was acquired in 2019-20 to satisfy all printing requirements including Mark sheets/Grade cards as per

University guidelines.

CCTV Cameras and Recorders

Till 2020-2021, there were 34 CCTV cameras in various locations at the campus. In the year 2021 -2022 these were increased to 73 with turbo HD for ensured security surveillance.

The Founder President Dr. Rajkumar Kolhe of JMF VMDC has Chosen the way of Education for the development of society and providing quality education and adding a necessary flavor to the life of the Youngsters.

According to University guidelines, the College Development Committee (CDC) is formed with Chairperson of Governing Council, Secretary of Governing Council, the Coordinator of IQAC, Heads of departments, and representatives from industry and society, as well as representatives of teaching and non-teaching staff. The CDC and the governing body create a perspective plan. The CDC meets at least twice a year to discuss matters pertaining to the development of the college in line with the Perspective plan and budgetary allocations. All the office staff together oversee the efficient execution of daily administrative tasks and timely compliance to all government and university regulations.

Statements of bank accounts are also checked from time to time. The internal auditor also maintains the adequacy of the internal control system.

The external auditor conducts statutory audit at the end of every financial year. External auditor also audits the use of accepted accounting procedures. The external audit is done by DSS and Company up to 2021 and thereafter by DYK & Associates. The books of accounts are duly checked by the external auditor. There are no audit objections so far in the college.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

6.5.1

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the

Response:

IQAC continuously reviews and takes steps to improve the quality of the teaching-learning process. Based on feedback collected, the following improvement are implemented:

Academic calendar: The academic calendar of the college is prepared every year well in advance by the IQAC and the Chief Coordinator. The IQAC coordinator discusses the various content and action plans for each year and with some suggestions given by the Principal and Management, the academic calendar is finalized.

Developing and implementing policies: IQAC takes initiatives in developing new policies for better functioning of the college and also looks after whether the policies are implemented properly or not.

Student learning outcomes: To improve the student learning outcomes, IQAC comes up with new teaching processes like introducing ICT into daily lectures conducted. Student support services: IQAC focuses on the improvements in student support services including counseling, mentoring and career guidance.

Faculty Development, Workshop and Seminar: IQAC focuses on faculty development programs to improve teaching abilities, encourage research activities, and stay updated in their respective field. IQAC facilitates workshops and seminars by ensuring quality content, contributing to the enhancement of academic development in educational settings.

Response:

BEST PRACTICE NO. 1

TITLE: STUDENTS ADOPTION SCHEME

INTRODUCTION:

The Students Adoption Scheme refers is a well-structured programme at Vande Mataram Degree College aimed at giving psychological support to students to improve their academic environment and ensure success.

OBJECTIVES:

- To ensure an inclusive development of the students
- To make students ready to face the future challenges
- To empower the students to handle emotional aspects in day-to-day activities
- To inspire students to unlock their potential and achieve success in their life.

CONTEXT:

Students need guidance at times of difficulties. The Students Adoption Scheme addresses the challenges

faced by the disadvantaged students. It provides comprehensive assistance, ensuring no student is left behind, and emphasizes holistic development, providing timely guidance and support from mentors. It helps students thrive academically and personally.

THE PRACTICE:

The adoption system is maintained in a hierarchical order. It begins with the head of College, the principal, and flows towards the students (mentees) via the respective teacher-mentors. The practice involves keeping a mentor for a group of students throughout the academic year.

The principal serves as a Chief-mentor to all the teacher-mentors as well as students and oversees mentoring efforts of teachers. He conducts periodical meetings and guides the teacher-mentors with respect to allotting mentees, issues identification in students, methods of mentoring and improvement evaluation. The principal devises innovative strategies to address the students' challenges.

The teacher-mentors will collect basic data of students such as proficiencies, attributes, socioeconomic status and other personal information. Each mentor conducts at least two common meetings with the mentees in a year. In addition, need-based interactions are held on one-to-one basis related to curricular and extracurricular matters, challenges faced and personal problems encountered for which they require guidance. A general observation about the problems faced by students includes financial issues, curriculum related grievances, family issues, etc.

EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS:

1. The student-teacher relationship has considerably increased.
2. Due to the direct involvement of teachers with their students and prompt solutions, instances of student unrest and grievance have significantly decreased.
3. A cordial atmosphere in the College is developed. Students feel free to meet the teachers for their issues, if any.
4. The participation in extracurricular and co-curricular activities of the students has increased.
5. The drop-out rate of students has been reduced. The system works as a mitigation scheme to retain the students.

PROBLEMS ENCOUNTERED:

1. Hesitation to share the issues with mentors reduces the likelihood of solution to the problem. Such students are sent to Counselor, freely available in the campus.
2. Few students are unable to share their problems, due to the communication barriers. One-to-one private meetings resolve this.
3. Students could not meet their mentors during the pandemic. However, online meetings have been arranged.
4. Financial issues are the recurring problems. The management offers variety of schemes such as freeship, scholarship, Book Bank facility, etc.
5. There were cases where the mentors could not resolve the issues. Principal personally attend to such cases and resolve.

BEST PRACTICE NO. 2

TITLE: SOCIAL OUTREACH AND COMMUNITY SERVICES

The social outreach and community services are the activities performed by the College for the benefit of community at large. The students engage themselves in various social activities along with their mentors and activity in-charges, and learn many lessons required for life.

OBJECTIVES:

- To enhance social interactions of individuals, groups, organizations and communities.
- To empower the students to learn necessary life skills from the society.
- To help the society through value-based activities and awareness programmes that enable them to lead a healthy life.
- To develop the constructive forces both from within and around the individual for a service outlook.

CONTEXT:

The society suffers invariably from various issues such as flood, pandemic, shortage of infrastructure and deviating socio-cultural specifics. These affect learning and normal living. Our College prioritizes the development of students' life skills, social empowerment and mindfulness to deal with these issues. Through guided social activities, students work towards improving quality of life, social connectedness, multiculturalism and diversity. This fosters a sense of social responsibility.

THE PRACTICE:

Staff, students and alumni of the college participate in community services. Departments incorporate social initiatives while planning their academic calendar. The NSS Cell being the soul of our College conducts regularly developmental camps at adopted villages Dhasai and Shivneri, blood donation camps, rallies and street plays highlighting social issues, awareness campaigns on gender issues, issuance of voter ids and aadhar cards, etc. Forty two extension activities have been conducted by the NSS students during the last five years, giving an impetus to social services.

The Life Science department created environment-friendly paper bags and distributed them to local vendors freely. It organizes health checkup camp, and provides medical services and medications to rural areas.

Our CS-IT department carries College computers and offers free Computer training to students of Ahilyabai Holkar Municipal School who face infrastructural challenges.

Top of Form

The Chemistry department conducts science practicals at Bharat Mata School regularly for promoting science in daily life through experiments by carrying college laboratory equipments and materials.

During the COVID-19 Pandemic, staff and students have done free distribution of sanitizer and masks to needy people.

EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS:

- 1.The underprivileged students of schools in nearby community could perform science and computer practicals on their own in spite of lack of infrastructure at their institute.
- 2.The concepts of environmental sustainability and social responsibility are instilled in students who will take care of the society in their purview.
- 3.The awareness created and social activities done have developed a social spirit and ready mindset in students to contribute for society’s betterment.
- 4.A social networking got developed enabling College and its stakeholders to further progressive activities needed to society.

PROBLEMS ENCOUNTERED:

- 1.Initially, students’ participation in extension activities was poor since it does not have direct relation to results.
- 2.Holding students’ attention in the awareness programmes was difficult.
- 3.Limited time available with students for social activities was a drawback along with managing academic achievements.
- 4.Arranging funds for social causes, lack of facilities at centers, matching time for extra services were the real challenges.

Dedicated staff members are available in the College office to assist the students with the scholarship process, do follow up and ensure that the students avail the financial resources required for their educational accomplishments.

1. Provision of Institutional Scholarships:

The development of all categories of students is the goal of our college. To achieve this goal, the College has institutionalized financial assistance to the needy students in the form of “Institutional Scholarships.” The management provides Scholarship & Freeship to students who are financially weak, physically challenged, lost the parents, as well as others deserving support in order to position themselves in the competitive world.

The College gives scholarships or freeships under the following categories:

- **JMF Scholarship**

Under this scholarship scheme, the management helps the girl students and students with single parent. This facility is given to such students irrespective of their getting government scholarship. Students shall apply for this using the printed application form available in the College Office.

- **JMF Students Welfare Scholarship**

VMDC gives 50% remission in the college fees to handicapped and orphaned Children.

Duly filled printed application forms along with the documentary evidences should be submitted in the College Office for getting this benefit.

- **JMF All India Level Scholarship**

This is a Merit Scholarship given to the toppers in all the batches of UG & PG Programmes.

More than 80% Marks – Rs.2000

More than 75% Marks – Rs. 1500

More than 70% Marks – RS. 1000

Scholarships, including fee concessions, support for disabled students, acknowledgment of academic excellence and assistance for economically disadvantaged students are granted based on students' diverse needs. Needy students who face unique individual challenges are eligible for various educational concessions.

Many students are assisted and guided to get scholarships from various Charitable Trusts & NGOs for which college gives required letters and testimonials. The concessions and tuition fee waivers are awarded to students based on their overall conduct, academic progress, class attendance and financial circumstances.

During the Covid-19 pandemic, many students and their families encountered severe financial difficulties, which caused tremendous disruption to both society and individual life. As a result, many students considered stopping their education. Many students struggled to pay their tuition fees due to family troubles and personal losses. Seeing how serious the problem was, the management made the decision to give more scholarships and more fee exemptions, allowing students to get out the situation without having any negative effects on their academic record.

In the academic year 2022-23, more than 1350 students have benefitted from the Scholarships and financial welfare measures under the Governmental and institutional scholarship schemes available to

students. Over the period of five years from 2018-19 to 2022-23, more than 6000 students have benefitted from the Institutional and Governmental Scholarship schemes. Year after year, the benefits provided are increasing. This increasing benefits offered to students ensure that the student community receives financial support during challenging times, guaranteeing uninterrupted access to quality education.

Admission to any student was never denied for want of money. Economically backward students are facilitated to take admission by paying even less than 5% of the programme fee. Multiple instalments facility is also provided to students enabling convenience in fee payment. Students from distant places too select this College for the support that we give for achieving education.
